series we are sad to see end

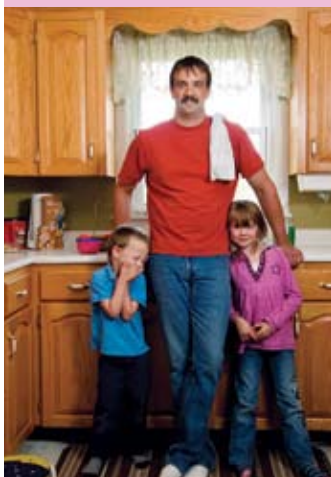

- 1 The End of The World As We Know It** by Robert Goolrick (Algonquin Books, \$26) In this startling memoir of addiction and abuse, Robert Goolrick reveals how a single horrific event can alter the course of an entire life. Goolrick recounts his lifelong journey with a raw honesty that is deeply painful and incredibly moving. —AM
- 2 Who Do You Think You Are?** by Alyse Myers (Touchstone, \$28) In this heart-wrenching memoir, Alyse Myers explores a mother-daughter relationship taut with contempt and misunderstanding. With unpretentious honesty, Myers depicts a mother she hated, a woman who she later discovers she never really knew. —SC
- 3 Split: A Memoir of Divorce** by Suzanne Finamore (Dutton Books, \$25) Bestselling author Suzanne Finamore is no stranger to storytelling, but when her husband left her and their toddler son, it was a scene that even she could not have imagined. In a memoir that showcases her fantastic wit, Finamore takes readers along on her journey as a newly single mother. —AM
